What is Effective Discussion?

Effective discussion goes beyond simple conversation. It involves listening actively, speaking clearly, and contributing constructively.


Such discussions are guided by a **purpose**, whether it's **problem-solving**, **information-sharing**, or **evaluating texts**.





Principles of Interaction

Interaction is a two-way process. Key principles include:



Effective interaction promotes understanding and deepens the relationship between participants. It's not just about speaking but also understanding the perspectives of others.



Active listening is the foundation of effective discussion.

It involves:

- Giving full attention to the speaker,
- Refraining from interrupting,
- Understanding the message's essence.




Asking Questions

Questions can guide a discussion and prompt deeper thinking.

Effective questioning techniques involve open-ended questions that encourage expansive answers.

Questions should be clear, relevant, and provoke thought, leading to rich interactions and discoveries.





Maintaining Composure and Empathy

Techniques:

- Staying calm under stress
- Taking deep breaths
- Pausing before responding
- Maintaining a neutral tone

Empathy:

- Understand the other person's perspective
- Show that you care about their feelings



Expressing Ideas Confidently

Articulation is crucial in group settings.

Be concise, clear, and relevant.

Confidence in expression helps in making your point understood. To speak confidently:

- Organise your thoughts before speaking
- Avoid unnecessary words
- Ensure your message aligns with the discussion.



Creating Actionable Follow-Up Plans

Giving Feedback

Feedback is essential for growth.

- Delivered with respect
- Focusing on the idea rather than the person
- Refine ideas and ensure clarity in discussions





Effective Communication Frameworks Situation – Behaviour- Impact

Situation

- Describe the specific situation where the behaviour was observed.
- Be precise about when and where it happened.

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Behaviour:

- Describe the specific behaviour you observed without making judgments or assumptions.
- Focus on actions, not character.




Impact:

- Explain the impact of the behaviour on the team, the work, or the individuals involved.
- Discuss how it made you or others feel, and the consequences it had.
